CHAIRMAN'S CORNER



First the good news. We recently teamed up with the Bedfordshire FA to host at our Keech Hospice Care stadium a very well attended Continuing Professional Development course on women's football coaching. The not so good news is that most of those in attendance were men.

Through VEO the new sponsors of Biggleswade United's women's section not only are we able to provide subscription free football for the women in our two senior sides, we are also

offering ten level one coaching courses to club volunteers or local women.

So far only four women have shown any interest in taking us up on our offer.

For the past four years we have been actively trying to get more women involved on the coaching side at the club both in the youth section as well as with our senior sides.

Both of our women's teams are currently

coached by men and as good as they are and as much as we can continue in the same vein, they realise, as we all do, that some female coaching input in a women's football set up would help to make the teams better.

But it isn't just for the female section where I would like to see a greater female presence but throughout the club with all teams of all ages and gender.

I'm not exactly sure why we should be struggling to find women coaches although I suspect that perhaps women don't see a clear pathway from the world of volunteering into what they perceive to be the male fuelled world of football coaching.

In the world of coaching If a male coach does well with training youngsters then the chances are they may well go one step further and progress into a higher grade Academy.

Those coaches that involve themselves with senior football may well look into the possibility of entering the world of semi-professional or even full professional levels of the game. I am not convinced that women currently believe this is something available to them.

What we are trying to establish at our club is that road that will demonstrate to those women who join us in a coaching capacity that there is nothing to stand in their way if they want to go on to bigger and better things in the world of football and that everyone regardless of gender, nationality or sexual orientation will be given exactly the same opportunity to maximise their potential.

We are fortunate that at our club we have a number of UEFA, A, B and Pro Licence coaches that are always on hand to assist, advise and act as mentors to anyone who needs their guidance.

In the first instance I believe that we will build our project from within by looking close to home and recruiting new coaches from those

girls and women who are currently playing for our female sides but whatever we do, we need to ensure that we find a way of guaranteeing that the women that make up around half of the world's population are as well represented and equally respected in the world of football as their male counterparts are.

STORY OF OUR CLUB

Biggleswade United Football Club was re-formed on the 16th July 1959. However, local history records indicate that there was a Biggleswade United side playing at Second Meadow as early as 1929. Our first season (1959/60) saw us competing in Division Three of the North Herts. League (NHL). After 10 successful years in the NHL the club made the step up to South Midlands League (SML) football. But towards the end of a 15-year association with the SML the club began to struggle and after three years of finishing in the bottom three of Division One we sought fresh fields. The club joined the Herts. Senior but club continued to find the going tough. In 1986 we elected to return to local League football, joining the Bedford and District Football League and began to build again.

The appointment of Brian Swords as first team manager in 87/88 proved to be the turning point in the club's fortunes. During the next ten years the club achieved a tremendous amount of success on and off the football pitch. Our record of League and Cup honours speak for themselves but aligned to this a great deal of work went on behind the scenes to match the on-field success. The club now boasts one of the best clubhouse and ground facilities in the Mid-Bedfordshire area. The success of the club has also attracted many new players as well as commanding a great deal of loyalty from those players who helped the club progress from Division Three of the Bedford and District League to County Senior Club status in just 15 years.

The 1995/96 season was the most successful in

the club's history - winning five major honours; the Beds Intermediate County Cup, Bedford and District League Championship, League Cup Championship and as the League's representatives the club won the Beds. FA Centenary Cup. Having won every major Bedford League honour the club felt it was time to move on and made the decision to make the step up once again and returned to Division One of the SML. In an exceptionally successful first season we celebrated a Division One "double" by winning the Championship and the Division One Cup. We also retained the Beds. FA Intermediate County Cup, only the second club in the competition's history to achieve this feat. To crown our success the club were awarded the SML Special Achievement Trophy in July 1997.

In the season 1997/98 we finally achieved Senior status. This was achieved not only through the endeavours of the players on the field but ultimately as a result of an extremely hard working committee. With the help of the Biggleswade Town Council a new stand was erected and perimeter fencing installed. And two seasons later the club erected floodlights and on the evening of 26th October 1999 we played our first-ever floodlit game at Second Meadow, Ryman League side Leighton Town were the visitors in the Bedfordshire Premier Cup.

The next eleven years saw the first team led by Steve "Snowy" Wright and under his management the club continued to enjoy a very high level of League and Cup success ultimately achieving promotion to the Molten Spartan South Midlands

League Premier Division and with it the opportunity to compete in the FA Cup. And under Snowy the club made three Beds FA Senior Challenge Cup final appearances, winning two of the three with victories over Stotfold (4-1) and Leighton Town (1-0) but missed out in 2006/07 going down 2-0 to Dunstable Town. Snowy's other cup successes came in the form of the Hunts Premier Cup, North Beds Charity Cup, Hinchingsbrooke Cup, the SML Division One Cup and the SML Special Achievement Award once again. The end of the 2006 2007 saw Snowy step down as manager with his assistant, Nick Burton taking over the first team reins. January 5th 2009 saw the club embark on further ambitious ground improvements. With financial backing from Biggleswade Town Council, Mid Beds District Council and the Football Foundation we installed a 260-seater stand, fully enclosed the ground with a double turnstile entrance and players' secure walkway which raised the ground to Grade E status. After several years of stability in terms of first team managers the next six years saw a regular turnover of first team and reserve team managers with Nick Burton, Dave Elkin and Phil Childs all taking over the first team reins for a time.

At the start of the 2013 2014 season we appointed Mick Reardon and Mark Royal as first team managers both of whom had enjoyed success as coaches at the higher levels of football. Their disciplined approach was quickly adhered to and responded to by the players and under their stewardship we achieved the highest Premier Division position in nine years and first silverware in seven years winning the North Beds Charity Cup for the first time in the club's history.

In November 2014 the club took a further positive step to realise our ambitions with the appointment of Sky Sports Presenter and renowned author, Guillem Balague as Biggleswade United's Director of Football. Following Mick and Mark's decision to step down at the end 2014 2015, Guillem was quick to act and recruited a new Head Coach in Cristian Colas Beccera. Cristian was assisted by former professional player, Stuart Bimson, and under their guidance the team finished in eighth spot in the Premier Division in 2017 2018 - the highest position in the club's history. Having built a strong reputation for their outstanding coaching ability and playing philosophy Cristian

and Stuart moved up to Step 3 level club, Staines Town, for the start of the 2018 2019 season. Guillem was again in search for a high quality coach and Jimmy Martin came highly recommended by his predecessor, Colas, who worked with Jimmy at Stevenage FC Academy. Jimmy was appointed Manager in May 2018 but he tendered his resignation in October 2018 having been offered a "hard to refuse" opportunity to take up a coaching role at Premier Division club Watford. Despite the setback the first team went on to record their highest ever League placing – a fourth spot in the Premier Division.

In the season 2019 2020 the club were sitting in a highly commendable third position in the Premier Division and under the management of Chris Devane and Trishnan Patel were hoping for a promotion play off opportunity. However, in March 2020 the season was declared Null and Void by the FA after the devastating outbreak of the Coronavirus. The club were also to learn that Chris and Trishnan had accepted the offer to work at Step 4 and departed the club at short notice. Fortunately the club were able to call upon the services of former Head Coach Cristian Colas. Cristian took the club to its highest ever position in the club's history at the curtailment of the 20/21 season leaving us second in the table on PPG. The club applied for promotion to Step 4 but were unsuccessful. A double whammy came when the club were subjected to a lateral move to the UHlsport United Counties League. After ten years of steady progress at Step 5 the club now face a challenging period that will require steadfastness and perseverance as we work to rebuild a squad that will once again be challenging for promotion. The club has certainly come a long way in relatively few years but we could not have done it without the help of a very supportive Town and District Council who clearly understand the benefits of having a community based club in Biggleswade. Our success is also very much down to a very hard working committee who throughout the year - not just the football season - continue to volunteer their time and commitment to the club, to help it continue to thrive and be a source of enjoyment for our supporters and the Biggleswade community.

OUR OPPONENTS

The Club's roots lie in the car industry which has long been a staple of the economy in this corner of East London and Essex, and give us several 'sister' clubs both locally and nationally. Previously known as Ford United F.C. which dated from a 1958 or '59 merger between two older clubs, Ford Sports F.C. (Dagenham) and Briggs Sports F.C., both of which were founded in 1934. Up until WW2, the latter actually began life as Briggs Motor Bodies F.C. and entered a team in the London League under that name between 1935 and '51. The Ford United Club was in serious problems at the start of 1995/6 season, however, as sponsorship was lost and disbanding seemed a real danger, until Vice-Chairman George Adams enlisted Sky Sports as sponsors, rescuing the Club. Nicknamed 'The Motormen', they play in Blue Shirts and White Shorts. The name of Ford United was to end forever when the club was changed at the start of the 2004/05 season to Redbridge Football Club in a bid to gain more local support and become firmly established as the highest placed football club in the London Borough of Redbridge.

Briggs Sports played at the Victoria Road ground, now famous as home of Dagenham & Redbridge. Ford United's old ground was the Ford Sports & Social Club in Rush Green. Romford F.C. shared the ground in 1995/6, providing valuable funds at a difficult time. Sadly, this pleasant ground was ruled unacceptable to the Isthmian League in summer of 2000 since its owners, Ford Motor Company, would grant only a yearly lease, so some 40 years of history there came to an end and a new home was leased at Oakside Stadium in Barkingside.

Along with the support of Kayleigh, in 2020, we started a new U6 team, originally, so our son Zac and his friends had somewhere to play football and where better than BUFC. They faced so much disruption with Covid restrictions, however they stuck together through to U7's and now U8's.

This season we have grown our U8 set up by welcoming our new U8 Blues team and their coach David Jackson.

It's been great to see the progression of the U8 Reds team this season, we couldn't be prouder of how they have taken on the challenge of being moved up 4 divisions, and although the results may not always go our way, they have shown a real improvement in their understanding of the game.

They are continuing to work hard in training and on the pitch with a smile on their faces which is the most important thing. Two players left at the start of the season and because of this, several of the children have been given the opportunity to grow and flourish. Children that were maybe quiet or nervous last year, have really stepped up and turned into real leaders on the pitch.

We currently have spaces available in our U8 Blues team, so please get in touch if you would like to get involved.

We are also excited to start our new U6 team at the beginning of November. Led by Kayleigh, who has taken advantage of the free coaching course space for Women, girls

coach Craig, Ben Gibson and myself, we have organised these sessions in preparation for a team to play in the U7 league next season. We have had a great response to our adverts and are expecting around 10 children to attend the first session of which 4 are girls!!

It was great to have the opportunity to help organise the BUFC Vets team towards the end of last season and with Nick Witcombe as Manager, Kayleigh Thomas as secretary and myself as Captain we have managed to pull together a great group of players who despite being 35+, still fancy themselves as a bit of a player!

We joined the league last year with only a few games left, ending with 2 good wins and a defeat. This season, with just two league games played we have a record of 1 win and 1 defeat.

Even in Vets football, commitment is paramount, which can be tough when juggling work, coaching youth football and some player still playing Saturday and Sunday football for other teams. This is even more obvious when we have 30+ players signed on, however sometimes only managing 12 for a match or 7 for training. However we have a great core group of players who are determined to keep on playing as long as their joints and muscles will allow them too.

Equally important is that Play Safe is not a one-off campaign – it will be used at key points in the football calendar to remind everyone in football, that children's welfare and keeping them safe, should be at the heart of all that we do."

As the Survivor Group points out, you'll see Play Safe appearing at various points throughout the season to keep safeguarding front of mind in football. Together, we want to do everything we can so everyone – particularly children and young people – has a consistently positive experience of our great game.
